

We recommend:

- That Israeli and Palestinian leaders work together to formulate a joint statement acknowledging the pain caused by both sides in regards to child involvement, pledging to do everything in their power to prevent future incidents involving children.
- The invitation of an informed neutral party to advise and monitor the Israeli Defense Force's crowd control efforts as it relates to children.
- The co-production of bilingual history books to include Israeli and Palestinian narratives for optional use in both Israel and Palestine.
- The provision of financial support to artists who create works of art promoting peace.
- The creation of murals and monuments of peace in areas where rioting and violence tend to occur. Activities should take place at these sites to show respect for each other and the victims of violence.
- Increased production of documentaries that allow Palestinian children a non-violent outlet for expressing their suffering and anxiety to the international community.
- The establishment of a program focusing on the rehabilitation of minors traumatized during the conflict - one component of which could be a conference.
- Implementation of programs empowering Israeli and Palestinian parents to understand the psychological effects on their children of participation in or exposure to violence.
- That the international community provide substantial funds for a Palestinian college scholarship program that will provide children with an attainable goal that encourages school attendance.
- The education of Israeli and Palestinian community leaders in non-violent protest methods.
- Encouraging the organization and implementation of a safe, non-violent protest that is pre-approved by authorities, such as a march by Palestinian women and children through an Israeli neighborhood, and exploring the possibility of a reciprocal one.

Exploring the possibility of establishing a joint force to provide security in border areas including:

- joint training (for trust building/team building).
- agreed guidelines on safety procedures.

The employment of a new Israeli force trained specifically in crowd control and riot control in areas of frequent Israeli/Palestinian conflict, supplementary to current forces.

The resumption of Israeli and Palestinian soldiers patrolling together.

That a popular singer from each side of the conflict sing a song of peace.

The creation of more television programs showing Israelis and Palestinians interacting.

The focusing on Palestinian children by:

- providing activities that are an alternative to fighting, such as: boxing, sports, art, writing, peaceful marches, conferences).
- not preventing them from attending school during security closures.
- creating "child safe" zones and "family safe" zones for activities with children.

The creation of sports competitions for mixed teams of children.

The enactment of media reforms increasing efforts to:

- broadcast Palestinian grievances on Israeli radio and TV.
- broadcast Israeli grievances in Arabic for Palestinians.
- develop a joint children's media network with children from both sides.

Using the language of peace to put a negative spin on violence on both sides involving minors (under 18 years old as defined by the international community)

The development, testing and use more non-lethal weapons alternatives such as: water cannons, glue, diarrhea gas, stun guns, sound, and gravel guns.

The creation of a voluntary, short-term exchange program for children.
